Living In Between is a multi-award winning anti-racism workshop. Members of the Students Against Racism tell the story of why they left their homeland, the journey that brought them to Australia and their life now. Activities allow the students and audience to the forms and consequences of racism, and how it can be addressed.

Living in Between can be presented in schools, workplaces and at events. Activities are tailored to the audience and will inspire and educate students and community leaders alike.

Cost: \$550 - \$1,100 depending on length (1-2 hours) and number of participants.

Pathways to Opportunities

This project is designed to support young people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds to transition to part-time work or further study.

Tasmanian workplaces are invited to support the project by providing TasTAFE students, who are also members of Students Against Racism, with opportunities for work placement (three to five days unpaid entry-level work). Employers can also invite the students to the workplace to deliver the *Living In Between* workshop.

Pathways to Opportunities is a partnership between Students Against Racism, A Fairer World and TasTAFE, with funding support for 2019-2021 from the Tasmanian Department of State Growth.

Students Against Racism is a group of young people from refugee and migrant backgrounds who deliver workshops about the impacts of racism. It is run alongside the Youth Migrant Education Program at TasTAFE and in partnership with A Fairer World.

Students Against Racism was started in 2008 by a small group of culturally and linguistically diverse students and EAL teacher, Gini Ennals, at Hobart College. Students realised that most of the racism they were experiencing was the result of ignorance and misinformation.

The students decided that they would share the stories of their journeys to Tasmania and how racism affected their day-to-day lives to raise awareness and build cultural competency in the community.

Students Against Racism has delivered workshops to over 13,500 people in schools, universities, TAFE classes and community groups across Tasmania and interstate. Over 320 young people from countries including Sudan, Congo, Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria, Bhutan, Burma, Ethiopia, Egypt, China, Thailand, Iran, Pakistan, India, Chile, Poland, Italy, Vietnam, Uganda, Burundi, Kuwait and Timor, have participated in the group and trained as presenters.
